WELCOME to WORSHIP

HEALING PRAYERS are offered during the distribution of Holy Communion. Kneelers are provided on the east and west sides of the sanctuary. Trained healing ministers are waiting to receive your requests before or after receiving the Eucharist. It can be especially meaningful to have a laying on of hands and an anointing of oil, if desired. It is appropriate to bring ANY request or concern that you may have for yourself or someone else. These may be prayers for emotional, spiritual, or physical healing. It can be a peace that brings wholeness, according to God's will, in a number of ways. If you are unable to walk to the kneelers, please ask an usher to assist or move to the bottom of the stairs on the East side of the sanctuary (near the pulpit) and the Healing Minister will come to you.

COMMEMORATIONS:

James of Jerusalem October 23
martyr, died around 62

One of three early-church leaders named James, this man is identified in the New Testament and by a historian of the time as a brother of Jesus. Scholars are uncertain whether this means a blood brother. He was a leader of the church in Jerusalem.

Philipp Nicolai, died 1608 October 26
Johann Heermann, died 1647
Paul Gerhardt, died 1676; hymnwriters

These great hymnwriters all worked in seventeenth-century Germany in times of war and plague. Nicolai, a pastor, lost 1,300 parishioners to plague, 170 in one week. He wrote "O Morning Star, how fair and bright" and "Wake, awake, for night is flying." Heermann's hymns, including "Ah, holy Jesus," often express the emotions of faith. Gerhardt, perhaps the greatest Lutheran hymnwriter, was a pastor in Berlin.

October 21**EMERGENCY DRILL**

Facilitators: Building and Property Committee

The church will be exercising an emergency drill during the Discipleship Hour. This year, the practiced action will be a police response. Real world scenarios that could initiate a police response at Saint Andrew's could be something as simple as someone yelling or becoming belligerent. Or it could be as devastating as a Sandy Hook or Parkland type of event. Anytime that a police response is appropriate, anyone can push one of the blue Police buttons located at exit doors throughout our building. The buttons are simple to operate: lift the cover, press and hold the blue button for about two seconds. This will sound the "police siren" alarms throughout the building, call 911 for a police response, lockdown the exterior doors, and send text messages to teachers and staff.

If you hear the siren alarm in the building, you should take one of these three actions, in preference order:

- **RUN** – If you can safely run away from the event, that should be your first priority. While at Saint Andrew's, you should run to the Mormon Temple parking lot.
- **HIDE** – If you don't know where the event is, or cannot safely run in the opposite direction, you should hide in your current location. You should lock the doors to the room, close the blinds and shades, turn off the lights, and be silent. There are room-specific protocols to effectively Hide in every room; they are on the back of the Evacuation Map.
- **FIGHT** – Only as a last resort, if you cannot Run or Hide, should you engage the attacker. Some teachers and staff choose to carry keychain size pepper spray. You can also disrupt the attacker by throwing books, chairs, or anything available to you.

Washington schools are required to have a lockdown drill three times each year, so kids are probably more familiar with this than adults.

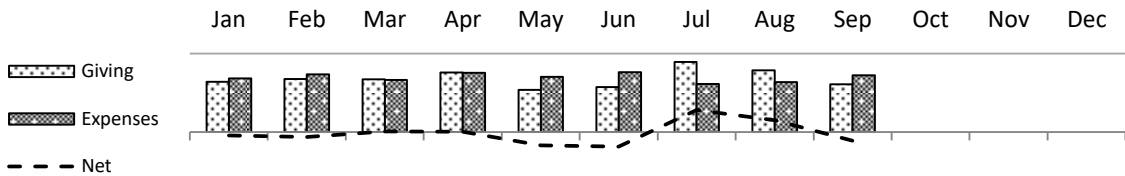
